Farley Will Arrive Today In State

POSTMASTER GENERAL TO MAKE ADDRESSES New Postoffices to Be Dedicated at Canton, Boone, Other Towns.

ASHEVILLE, April 8 (AP)—Postmaster General Farley will arrive in Asheville tomorrow morning for a two-day visit in western North Carolina, during which he will dedicate postoffices at Canton, Boone, and other towns. Mr. Farley will arrive from Asheville at 11:30 a. m. He will be met by the Asheville Chamber of Commerce and will spend an hour or so in the city and will go to Canton at 2 o'clock. He will then stop at postoffices in West Asheville, Bryson, and Canton, where ceremonies there will begin at 2 o'clock. The postmaster general will return to Asheville at 8 o'clock in the evening and will spend the night here. Leaving Asheville at 1:30 o'clock tomorrow morning, he will go to Boone for the second dedication ceremony scheduled for 11 o'clock. He will stop at Weaverville, Stockwell, Irvin and a dozen other small postoffices along the mountain route. He will leave for Washington at Salisbury at 9:45 o'clock.

WASHINGTON, April 8 (AP)—Ambrose O'Connell, second assistant postmaster general, and Smith W. Purdum, general postmaster general, will accompany Farley on his trip to Asheville. O'Connell is a Republican, North Carolina. Representative Weaver, Democrat, North Carolina, will accompany Farley. Mr. Purdum and other officials will accompany Farley on his trip from Asheville to Canton.

U-Boat Mystery Transport Is Sunk By English

Observers In Capital See Numerous Signs

ARENDAL, Norway, April 8 (AP)—The sinking of the German "mystery" transport Rio de Janeiro off Norway's coast today with the loss of 300 of the 600 Nazi army men aboard gave rise tonight to speculation whether the largest sea battle of the war was in the making. Navy observers wondered whether there would be a great clash between the British blockade and a German fleet of between 30 and 100 vessels reported moving toward the Skagerrak narrow arm of the North sea between Norway and Denmark. Such speculation was greatly heightened by the confusion of reports of naval action, most of which were not borne out. No confirmation could be obtained from the British command, but it is believed that two German submarines had attacked an armed British vessel off the coast and that one submarine and the British ship had been sunk. Dynamite Vessels Seized On Danube; Plot Charged

British Barges, Held By Rumanian Authorities, Are Said By Berlin to Be Part of Plot to Block German Supply Lines

BUCHAREST, April 8 (AP)—Detention of a fleet of dynamite-laden British barges, charged by Germans with being designed to blow up a narrow Danube gateway and block a German supply line, today electrified southeastern Europe with the fear war soon might spread to this quarter of the world. Rumanian police, acting on a tip said to have been supplied by the pro-Nazi Iron Guard, pulled the fleet near Giurgiu. The report that the barges were loaded with dynamite to block the spot in the Danube known as the iron gate by sinking the barges and wrecking the narrow channel where the river cuts through the Carpathian barrier between Germany and Rumania. The official British statement said the barges were loaded with dynamite, and that a British barge captain had neglected to declare the cargo. Two hundred Rumanian and Yugoslav soldiers, armed with machine guns, were guarding the gateway where the Danube flows into the Black Sea. Both the Rumanian foreign office and the Yugoslav government stated their quarters "barricaded" against reports British had been seized aboard the barges.

LABOR BOARD WINNER IN STEEL FIRM CASE

Supreme Court Refuses to Review Republic Steel Reinstatement Order

WASHINGTON, April 8 (AP)—The Supreme Court today refused to review a Republic Steel Corporation reinstatement order. The order, which was issued by the National Labor Relations Board, reinstated a worker who had been fired for participating in a strike. The Supreme Court's decision was a victory for the labor board.

HILO, Hawaii, April 8 (AP)—A fissure four to five miles long was opened today on the side of Mount Loa by an eruption which killed the Hawaiian people. The lava began flowing down the mountain in the direction of Hilo, threatening the city.

WORLD RESTS GERMANY; NAZIS INVADE DENMARK

Norwegian Foreign Minister Informs U. S. Envoy To Norway That Nation Is At War With Germany Following Attempted Entrance Of Four Nazi Warships Into Oslo Fjord And Attack From Air--Official Announcement.

LONDON, April 9.—(Tuesday)—(AP)—The Exchange Telegraph news agency said today that German troops had crossed the Schleswig frontier into Denmark and the Danish garrison at Sonderburg is retreating north. Three German cruisers have entered Middelfahrt harbor, the agency said. Soldiers were reported to have landed and occupied a nearby street in the port city. At least one heavy gun has been landed, it was said. Three large ships—probably troop transports—were reported in the Little Belt, the channel nearest the mainland. Middelfahrt lies on the Little Belt, 120 miles west of Copenhagen.

NEW YORK, April 9.—(Tuesday)—(AP)—The New York Times early today received from its Copenhagen correspondent, Svend Carlsens, also reported that three cruisers had landed troops at Middelfahrt, Denmark, immediately occupying the adjoining streets. He also reported "German troops crossed the Danish frontier."

Scapa Flow Again Raided; Allies Firm On Mine Use

German Planes Drop Incendiary and High Explosive Bombs On Naval Base—Three Craft Shot Down—Allies Are Defiant Over Mine-Laying Despite Protests.

LONDON, April 9.—(Tuesday)—(AP)—German warplanes dropped incendiary and high explosive bombs in their third raid within a month last night on Britain's Scapa Flow naval base, the air ministry reported early today. At least two German planes were shot down, the British said, and a third was believed brought down before the attack ended.

TWO STATES BALLOT TODAY IN PRIMARIES

Illinois and Nebraska Voters To Decide On Presidential Preferences.

WASHINGTON, April 8 (AP)—Primary balloting tomorrow in Illinois and Nebraska will give voters in the two states a choice of presidential candidates. The balloting will be held on the same day as the primary in Michigan, in the Wisconsin primary voting last week.
